On March 15, 2018 from 6-8pm, Morris Arts will host a free opening reception for the Gallery at 14 Maple's nineteenth exhibit, entitled approaching **VIBRANCY**. For this occasion, the Exhibition Committee of Morris Arts and the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation, with guest co-curators, Mary Birmingham and Sarah Walko (both from the Visual Arts Center of New Jersey), selected works by 39 outstanding New Jersey women artists (culled from over 1,000 submissions!). 

Morris Arts' Honors Ehlers and Coladarci Arts Scholarship Winners

On the evening of March 15, 2018 Morris Arts will introduce Pianist John Duc-Tuan Nguyen, winner of the Elaine Ehlers Arts Scholarship (of \$5,000), and actress Nicole Giordano, winner of the Eugenie Coladarci Arts Scholarship (of \$1,500), at the opening reception for *approaching* **VIBRANCY**, the new exhibit in the Gallery at 14 Maple. This year's Ehlers Scholarship winner, John Duc-Tuan Nguyen, is a graduating senior at The Academy for Mathematics, Science and Engineering in Rockaway. He plans to double major (or possibly minor) in music performance in college. Winning 3rd place in the 8th Chopin International Piano Competition, Grand Prix in the National Young Musician Showcase Competition and IMAS Talented Young Musician Olympia Competition, and garnering top places in numerous other national and international competitions, Nguyen has performed as a soloist at Carnegie's Weill and Zankel Halls, NJPAC and Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall. His piano teacher described him as "truly gifted," "exciting," a "striking talent," with a "marvelous musical imagination for both lines and colors." As a pianist, he is that rare combination of formidable technique coupled with a profound understanding of the music.

This year's Coladarci Scholarship winner is actress Nicole Giordano, a graduating senior at Mountain Lakes High School who plans to pursue a BFA in acting at college. With advanced training at the Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey', Boston University's Summer Theater Institute, she was a finalist at the Governor's Awards for the Speech and Theatre Association of NJ (besting nearly 500 competitors), won the Best Leading Actress award at the Bucks County Theatre Festival, and was one of 15 chosen from among 2,500 applicants for NYU's Tisch Future Theater Artists Program. Her drama teacher stated, "This girl's natural talents far outweigh those of many working actors today."

Visual artist Coral Coad, a graduating senior at West Morris Mendham High School, received Honorable Mention. The judges were unanimous in these choices. Congratulations to all!

Morris Arts and Storytelling Arts partner, expanding literacy programs in Morristown, Dover

Morris Arts is pleased to announce its partnership with Storytelling Arts, Inc. to expand early literacy programs with the students and teachers at the Morris County Head Start in Morristown and Dover. This program designed for students who face substantial socioeconomic obstacles that impede their ability to achieve "school readiness", uses storytelling to help develop emergent literacy skills, including: listening, vocabulary, comprehension, sequencing, and recall. These are the building blocks of reading, writing, and oral communication. The National Association for the Education of Young Children posits that readiness is more than basic knowledge of language and math, and those expectations should include physical, cognitive, social, and emotional competence, as well as a positive attitude towards learning. Storytelling specifically addresses human emotional development and provides a lens through which children can study and understand the world around them. This year, through funding from Morris Arts, the program was expanded to provide over 35 additional classroom visits.
