## Capturing NATURE

Man's fascination with nature is an ancient story. The decorated walls of over 340 caves in Spain and France are testimony to prehistoric man's artistic abilities and sensitivities. So refined are some of the depictions of animals, it is hard to believe that they are between 25,000 to 40,000 years old. These images can be examined on many levels: archeologically, artistically, chemically, historically, anatomically, biologically and botanically, or simply as an enduring statement from a people now gone. But, it is the very act of an artist interrupting, then rendering an image directly from nature—capturing nature—that is at the heart of this exhibition. Man has always forged the strongest of bonds with the forces of, and the beauty within, nature. The mysterious attraction of the artist to his/her surroundings is what we explore in *Capturing Nature*.

Natalia Margulis is an internationally celebrated fiber artist whose work is not easily categorized. She uses a needle and thread to create embroideries of sublime beauty. She produces her time-laborious pieces like the monastic scribes of the early Renaissance who were so focused and so close to their work, creating exquisite illuminations whose jewel-like colors literally glow. Natalia is that modern-day scribe whose guill is a needle and whose ink, paint and gold leaf is the thread she custom-dyes. Her relatively small works, which take from two months to three years to complete, share the same perfection as those 600 year-old illuminated manuscripts, except her images reveal her deep love affair with nature. The textures she achieves remind me of elegant impasto painting. The bark of a tree, a rippled fungus glowing orange, the detritus of rotting leaves on the stony soil and the reflection of tree trunks in a stagnant pond demonstrate her extraordinary ability to translate nature onto her unique palette. She is an uncompromising perfectionist whose broad vision is not sacrificed to the minutiae of her craft. One of Natalia's favorite Russian poets, Mikhail Lermontov, may have read her mind when he said, "Anyone who has chanced like me to roam through desolate mountains and studied at length their fantastic shapes and drunk the invigorating air of their valleys can understand why I wish to describe and depict these magic scenes for others."

Upon seeing Joseph Losavio's work for the first time, I was struck by its freshness. Although he admits to being inspired by a number of Eastern and Western masters, his work is not derivative of others'. His dreamy and haunting landscapes draw the viewer into his world. He says his images capture "earthly desire and spiritual transcendence, realism and abstraction." The bold shapes and colors in his oils and multimedia scenes evoke an irresistible sensuality—a temptation reminiscent of Odysseus and the Sirens. These two-dimensional pieces have three-dimensional attitude. A short "look" becomes a long stare as you are drawn into the depth of each landscape. Perhaps it is because these canvases are not merely scenes conjured in Joe's mind but rather each, a record of this visionary's journey--a painterly travelogue. His belief system and life philosophy are as layered and nuanced as is his work. Within his collection of cerebellar thought; he has included Jungian psychology, Sufism, Chinese and Japanese artistic tradition, American Modernist and Abstract Expressionist movements, spirituality and too many more items to fit neatly into an exhibition vitrine. Further, he has connected and molded this seemingly random assemblage of thoughts and ideas into a cohesive, complex philosophy. The wonder of it all is that he has laid it out in front of us so that we too can enjoy his world. His rich palette and exotic treatment of his subject is often suffused in the mysticism that so fascinates him and that he has embraced in his life.

I am a painter, working in the Visionary art tradition, who enjoys combining media (oil, collage elements and, at times, sculptural materials) to explore my personal concept of creation myth. Celebrating the Sufi mystical belief that Soul is the root of the manifest world, I employ landscape as metaphor for the self-reflective universe or a meeting place of Lover and Beloved.

Inspired by my love of Jungian psychology, comparative religions, Chinese and Japanese *literati* artistic traditions, American Modernist and Abstract Expressionist art movements, the images on my canvases vacillate between earthly desire and spiritual transcendence, realism and abstraction. I am concerned equally with transcribing the "force" that shapes creation as well as the forms themselves. I seek to celebrate creation as a magnificent, guiltless dialectic present in form and particular as well as unified whole. As a result, I delight in the process of juxtaposing contrasting elements (spatial relationships, color, value, pattern, abstract and realist content) to create interest, surprise and tension. I also enjoy pairing illusionistic painted passages with flattened decorative areas within the same work of art to highlight vision as a layered, textural, associative experience informed by relationships.

Each painting is begun without any preconceived sketches or notions, with only the expectation that each mark will inform the next and that the journey will proceed on its own terms, metaphorically taking on unexpected passengers and following various detours. In the end, the subject of each work becomes the process or journey itself. I view myself as a modern pilgrim or itinerant dervish who shares the view of the Italian film director, Federico Fellini, "the visionary is the true realist."



Inspired by nature's sublime beauty, I use a needle as a versatile instrument to recreate our natural environment as an embroidered textile. With my stitchery I investigate and express the endless transformation of nature through the seasons from new life to decay. The fluid and supple qualities of fiber allow me to reconstruct the natural forms and textures which fascinate me. Each piece is influenced by my desire to share and bring more meaning and joy into our lives. I am especially interested in creating the illusions of movement, delicacy, light and shadow.

Embroidered pictures, by means of their softness and vulnerability, awaken a deep sense of belonging to the organic world: through visual perception we experience physical tactility. The fragility of fiber is used to indicate the fragility of the world and reflects my passionate desire to help save and protect it.

Trying to expand the possibilities to express myself, I include all kinds of hand and machine stitches and often some elements of other fiber techniques such as dyeing, fusing, gilding, beading, heat distressing and embossing. These are my tools to achieve my art.


