Morris Arts/Dodge Foundation GALLERY at 14 MAPLE to open new exhibit on September 28th

Tandy Artworks by Dan Fenelon

On September 28, 2017 from 6-8pm, Morris Arts will host a free opening reception for the Gallery at 14 Maple's eighteenth exhibit entitled **icandy**. The Exhibition Committee of Morris Arts and the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation selected 28 works created between 2009 and 2017 by Morristown artist Dan Fenelon (paintings, mixed media, prints on wood and sculpture) for display at the Gallery, a distinctive space located on the 3rd floor of the LEED certified "green" building at 14 Maple Ave., Morristown.

Fenelon's dramatic imagery references ancient tribal petroglyphs and reflects his study of and interest in mythology, art history and early civilizations. His unique, highly recognizable visual language has developed over years of constant sketching, drawing and painting (on surfaces large and small). No viewer can forget his intricate designs, the shapes within shapes, the fantastical creatures, or his vibrant colors — ranging from intense "pop culture" hues, to the bold red/black and white combinations or the subtle grey/black/white blends. Fenelon's distinctive images are infused with energy and often combine the lighthearted with deeply meaningful expressions, always encouraging that "closer look." Perhaps most striking is Fenelon's ability to simultaneously work across a wide stylistic range utilizing



On Friday, September 22, 2017 from 7-9 pm, join Morris Arts at the free opening reception of the exciting Fall/Winter 2017-18 Invitational Exhibit at the Atrium Art Gallery, located on Floors 2-5 of the Morris County Administration and Records Building on 10 Court Street in Morristown. Meet the gifted artists whose works utilize oils, acrylics, mixed media, ink, and other media and range in style from the abstract to hyper-realism and pop surrealism.

The fifth floor Atrium will feature the hyper-realistic oils by prizewinning artist **Allan Gorman** (West Orange, NJ) whose works evoke artists as Edward Hopper, George Bellows and others...and reveal Gorman's fascination with the hidden patterns, aesthetic tensions, mystery and power of machines and industry. In the fifth floor Lobby, **Mark Oberndorf** (Wyckoff, NJ), another realist painter influenced by Hopper (and by Vermeer), portrays communal landmarks before their gentrification and/or demolition, combining vivid colors and a keen appreciation of natural light, creative composition and perspective. The fourth floor showcases the extensive and highly varied portfolio of **Joe LaMattina** (Hackensack, NJ), a longtime artist and art educator whose vast, mixed media output ranges from representational to "abstract/organic" – and includes his "human essence" works that eloquently capture states of mind and abstract feelings. A riot of brilliant colors from **Valerie Verona's** (Chester, NJ) vibrant acrylics energizes the third floor Atrium, blending representational and abstract imagery, while **David Nicolato's** (Verona, NJ) pop surrealism explores themes such as darker dreams, child development and the treatment of animals — with vividly imagined animal forms, fantastical beasts and whimsical yet unsettling imagery. Featured on the second floor, prizewinning artist **Lisa DeLoria Weinblatt** (Bayside, NY) shares her insightful, thought provoking *School Lunch* series of oils, a fascinating, expressive pictorial essay of contemporary student life which touches on cross cultural issues and emotional attitudes explored in the shared experience of school lunch.

Most works are available for sale, with details and pricing provided in the free catalogues found in the elevator lobby areas on floors 2-5. The Atrium Art Gallery is free and open to the public during business hours, 8:30am-4:30pm on Monday-Friday and will be open from 7pm-midnight at First Night Morris County on New Year's Eve. The exhibit remains in place until January 5, 2018.

Morris Arts' Tom Werder on Capitol Hill in July to save the National Endowment for the Arts

On July 27, Morris Arts Executive Director Tom Werder travelled to DC, joining selected arts advocates from around the country to lobby on behalf of retaining and funding the National Endowment for the Arts. Armed with Americans for the Arts' recent study, *Arts and Economic Prosperity 5*, Werder and the other advocates shared firsthand success stories of NEA-funded projects. Werder spoke movingly of Morris Arts' NEA-funded Gateway Totem Project, which celebrates the ethnic and economic diversity of the Morristown community and connects multiple communities to each other within the town. Coupled with the economic report's hard data, such stories vividly illustrated both the human impacts of NEA funding as well as the significant economic benefits of the nonprofit arts and culture industry. Supporting 4.6 million jobs nationwide, the nonprofit arts and culture industry generated \$27.5 *billion* dollars' worth of government revenue in 2015! Werder observed, "I used to say that I worked for an arts organization, but now I refer to us as a community-building organization — one that uses the powerful arts as a tool to bring our community together to create a place where people want to live, work, and play."

Participants included musician Ben Folds, and advocates Dan Bowers (TN), Julie Richard (ME), Wayne Andrews (MS), Alexis Hill (NV), Tom Benson (MT), Randy Cohen and Bob Lynch (both from Americans for the Arts), as well as Rep. Louise Slaughter (D-NY), Mayor Allison Silberberg (Alexandria, VA) and Congressman Leonard Lance (R-NJ). Happily, the two Morris County Congressmen, Rep. Lance (Co-chair of the Congressional Arts Caucus) and Rep Rodney Frelinghuysen (Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee) support the arts and allocated \$145 million in NEA funding for fiscal year 2018. Music Beyond Borders 2017 — From Ireland to China

Just completing its 8th year, this collaboration between Morris Arts and Mayo Performing Arts Center again presented four free outdoor world music and dance performances reflecting appreciation for the diversity of our community and the richness of world cultures. This year's series once again drew large crowds, with over 1,600 people enjoying programs featuring music and dance from **Ireland, Native American culture, West Africa and China** on June 27, July 11, July 25 and August 8, 2017 respectively. People of all ages, backgrounds, professions and ethnicities enjoyed this season's offerings. Crowds tapped their feet and danced along to the infectious rhythms and melodies of **Brian Conway's** expert **Irish Fiddling**, with **John Walsh** on guitar. Kids and their parents became warriors, buffalos, or alligators as they learned dance steps and stories from the **Redhawk Native American Arts Council** dancers. Rhythm was on full display with **Féraba**, which shared West African songs and dances (by renowned *griot*, **Ismael Kouyate**), intricate drumming techniques (by **Dekom Dembele**), tap dancing (by **Irene Koloseus**) and beautiful African melodies on the *balafon* (wooden xylophone - by **Andy Algire**). Children and adults tried out rhythm instruments and learned dance steps or made up their own to the music. The season concluded with the haunting, descriptive music by the virtuoso musicians of the **Music From China Trio.** Performing on the *yangqin* (hammered dulcimer), **Susan Cheng** provided fascinating background on each piece. **Wang Guowei**, a world-renowned virtuoso on the *erhu* (Chinese fiddle) performed passionate and haunting melodies while **Wang Junling** mesmerized the audience with her talent on the *zheng* (21 string plucked zither), highlighting works that depicted the fury of typhoons as well as the delicacy of flowers. The Keefauver Artist Residency at Copeland Middle School, Rockaway Township, NJ

In June of 2017, students and teachers at Copeland Middle School in Rockaway Township celebrated the completion of their new mural created during an Artist Residency with Morris Arts mural artist, Dan Fenelon. This artist residency was made possible through Morris Arts' Keefauver Arts in Education grant which allowed the school to invite the artist to work with their school community for two weeks. Selected by students, teachers and administrators, the mural's theme features the school mascot in a jungle setting surrounded by other animals happily engaged in 21st Century learning on computers, smartphones and iPads. The mural spans an entire side of the school foyer and its beautiful colors and images have transformed the space into a vibrant, exciting corridor.

One parent volunteer assisting with the residency said, "The mural itself is a thing of beauty but the process of students working together to create one piece was a great accomplishment and the students took great pride in that." A 7th grade student remarked, "This was an amazing project and I'm hoping to create a mural at my house over the summer."

Murals can bring to life areas of schools that often go unnoticed, inspire those who pass it each day and serve as a strong visual reminder that a school embraces the arts and creativity. We congratulate the students on their very successful mural residency.

On September 27, 2017 representatives from Morris County's arts and cultural communities will gather at the Freeholder meeting in support of the proclamation and highlight the importance of the arts at their own events and performances during the month.
