

The Atrium Gallery


This exhibit marks the reopening of the Atrium Gallery, showcasing the 28th annual exhibition and sale of African American Art presented by Art in the Atrium. At present, the show has been extended at least until July and perhaps beyond. Highlighting the works of the renowned Newark artist / poet / educator, the late Jerry Gant, this annual show includes works by 60 emerging and established African-American artists.

This year's show also honors the memory of Art in the Atrium's co-founder and artist / educator Victoria "Viki" Le Beaux Clark Craig who passed away December 27, 2018 and was honored by the Morris County Freeholders on Dr. Martin Luther King Day for her "three decades of service in creating and fostering the annual Art in the Atrium exhibit of African-American art in Morris County."

Guest curator, Yvette Lucas, selected works by nine distinguished New Jersey artists who each bring a unique perspective to the theme of Vanishing Worlds, whether confronting species extinction, lost libraries of the ancient world, disappearing professions, obsolete technologies, vanishing childhood or the gradual vanishings associated with aging. All are rendered with creative, imaginative and intriguing insights that encourage the viewer to reflect on the fleeting nature of existence and the inexorable march of time.

Along with Morris Arts' mission of building community through the arts, we take pride in our role of recognizing, acknowledging, and supporting the next generation of performing and visual artists. Morris Arts would like you to meet Chelsea Friedlander, soprano and opera singer who won Morris Arts' prestigious Eugenie R. Coladarci Scholarship in 2006. Awarded to high school seniors demonstrating excellence in the arts, this scholarship encouraged Chelsea in the pursuit of her arts education and ultimately a career in the performing arts. A graduate of the Cleveland Institute of Music with a Masters from the Manhattan School of Music, she has performed in operas by Mozart, Bernstein, Bizet, Offenbach, Monteverdi and others – with opera companies from California to NYC.

British Invasion Years band – a special success story

What better endorsement for a British Invasion Tribute band than opening for Ringo Starr?! If you love classic 60's rock, you will thrill to this group's note-perfect performances of music from The Beatles to The Beach Boys! Individually and collectively, they have performed with Eric Clapton, Bon Jovi, Southside Johnny and





the Asbury Jukes — at the Stone Pony, on the Tonight Show and Late Night with David Letterman. They rock (and pack!) the house every time.

The band formed in 1997 as the Robert Murdock Band, blending classic 60s British and American rock, and committed to researching and performing the most faithful and joyful "covers" of that iconic repertoire.

Twelve years ago (2008), Morris Arts' spotted their talent and presented them the Midday Music on the Green summer series, recommended them for other gigs and booked them multiple times for First Night Morris County performances at the Mayo Performing Arts Center. Each First Night performance drew standing-room-only crowds and standing ovations! In 2011, they realized that dream of every British Invasion tribute band: opening for one of the original Beatles, Ringo Starr! They have since shared the stage with other legendary artists such as The Beach Boys, Herman's Hermits, Leon Russell, connected with a major talent agency, toured and recorded widely. In addition to their exceptional talent, what is especially wonderful about this band is their genuine appreciation for the encouragement Morris Arts provided at the early stages of their career.

Frank Vignola, Guitar Great, First Night superstar and Morris Arts friend

"Frank Vignola is one of the most extraordinary guitarists performing before the public today. His stunning virtuosity has made him the guitarist of choice for many of the world's top musicians, including Ringo Starr, Madonna, Donald Fagen, Wynton Marsalis, Tommy Emmanuel, Mark O'Connor, the Boston Pops, the New York Pops, and guitar legend Les Paul, who named Vignola to his "Five Most Admired Guitarists List" for the *Wall Street Journal*. Vignola's jaw-dropping technique explains why the *New York Times* deemed him "one of the brightest...stars of the guitar".

As a world renowned guitarist working in jazz, swing, gypsy jazz, classical and pop music, Vignola has performed internationally, with some of the finest musicians in the world. Morris Arts has had the privilege of presenting him — to capacity crowds — at nearly every First Night Morris event since 2009. He has also been a host at Morris Arts' Great Conversations and performed at the Morristown Jazz & Blues Festival and other events in the area. Sharing an artist of this caliber with our community is one of the great joys of our work.

Teaching Artist Workshop

On May 14, Morris Arts

held an online workshop entitled Taking Your Program from Live to Live Stream. Attracting a capacity crowd, the workshop addressed the pandemic's enormous pressures on artists to adapt to a new and rapidlychanging digital reality.

The workshop provided an overview of online tools and ways to shift live content into online content. The presenters, John Bertles and Carina Piaggio are teaching artists, administrators and professional development specialists with the Kennedy Center - National Arts Partners program. They are also the husband and wife co-founders of Bash the Trash Environmental Arts. As Distance Learning Coordinator for Carnegie Hall's Education Program, Bertles re-imagined live programs to bring them to an online format and provided participants an overview on: Using the Technology; Transitioning your Show; Interacting with Students; Connecting with Schools. And, beyond the technology they also looked at translating the distilled essence of artists' shows into a new medium. In response to Morris Arts' support for this program, Bertles and Piaggio nominated Morris Arts for the Morris County Chamber of Commerce's 2020 Not for Profit Excellence Award for Innovative Programs.
